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MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, December 13, 1979

The regular meeting of the University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Vice President Noel L. Leathers, at 3 p.m. on Thursday, December 13, 1979 in Leigh Hall 307.

Fifty of the 67 members of Council (including one ex officio, for 1979-80) were present. Those absent with notice were: Dr. H. K. Barker, Mr. F. Bradshaw, Dr. T. Brittain, Dr. C. Carrino, Dr. C. Chen, Dr. M. d'Amico, Dr. A. Gent, Dr. C. E. Griffin, Dr. D. J. Guzzetta, Dr. A. Krigline, Dr. I. MacGregor, Mr. H. P. Schrank, Dr. S. Vander Ark. Others absent were: Dr. P. Gerhart, Mr. W. Medley, Dr. Ruth Roberts, Mr. D. Van Doros.

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the meeting of University Council of November 15, 1979 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of December 1, 1979. Since there were no additions or corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

Dr. Leathers then introduced Mrs. Dana F. Castle, Assistant Professor of Law, elected representative to Council replacing Mr. Hollis Allan, who passed away in November.

Dr. Holland was asked by the Chairman to read a resolution memorializing Mr. Allan. The resolution follows:

Resolution in Memory of Mr. Allan

WHEREAS Professor Hollis P. Allan joined the faculty of the School of Law of The University of Akron in 1972 and served with distinction as a member of the Law faculty; and

WHEREAS Professor Allan served the School of Law and The University of Akron with loyalty, effectiveness and dedication; and

WHEREAS he exemplified a high regard for the teaching profession, his colleagues, and especially the development of his students; and

WHEREAS he made substantial contributions to the community, as well as the profession of law; and

WHEREAS, his untimely death on November 18, 1979 deprived the Law faculty and the University of an esteemed associate: Therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the University Council express its sense of profound loss and sympathy to Mrs. Allan and the family and cause this resolution to be spread upon the minutes of this meeting, December 13, 1979.

It was moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted, and members of Council stood in respectful acceptance.

The Chairman called upon Dr. Bruce Holland to begin the reports of the standing committees with a statement from the Procedural Committee. Dr. Holland said that the Procedural Committee had met on Wednesday, December 5, 1979 to set the agenda for today's Council meeting.

Dr. Poston presented the curricular changes recommended by the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee, as circulated to Council. The first proposal was submitted by the Department of Elementary Education and is a change in program requirements for Elementary Education designed to provide teacher education students with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes which will enable them to model behavior and implement curricular programs consistent with the concept of cultural pluralism. He moved the approval of ED-80-3. The motion was seconded and carried. (All curriculum changes will be included in the Appendix to these minutes.)

Dr. Poston moved the approval of FA-80-3 effective spring 1980, adding that our Social Work Program has received temporary accreditation from the Council on Social Work Education and the Council's standards for baccalaureate professional programs state that preparation for effective social work requires development in the student of an appreciation for social research and an understanding of its impact on and application to practice. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Poston moved the approval of FA-80-11 effective spring 1980. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Poston moved that the Art Department's proposal FA-80-12 be approved, adding a new Option on Crafts Emphasis for Bachelor of Fine Arts. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Poston moved that the Music Department's proposal FA-80-14 adding the Option for the Master of Music be approved. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Poston referred to the proposed University of Akron Calendar for 1980-81. After some discussion the motion was made and seconded to place the calendar on the table for the January meeting of Council. Motion carried.

Dr. Poston then brought up an additional item, which had not been circulated, regarding a change in meeting dates of University Council from the third Thursday to the first Thursday of the month, with meetings scheduled October, November, December, February, March, April and May. Dr. Poston moved approval of this change. Motion was seconded by Dr. Dye and carried, to be effective fall 1980.

Dr. Holland reminded Dr. Poston of a motion carried at the April 19, 1979 meeting of Council which reads: "That the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee undertake a study of the merits, ways and means of introducing foreign language requirements, for all students at the General College level, and that the Committee report its findings and recommendations to the Council no later than November 1, 1979." Dr. Holland asked when a progress report on the study would be forthcoming. Dr. Poston thanked the secretary for the timely reminder and assured him that a report would be ready for presentation at the next meeting of Council.

Several members of Council asked for a policy statement regarding the closing of school before the Thanksgiving recess since it was not clear whether the time was 5 p.m. or the end of evening classes on the preceding Wednesday. The Chairman said closing time had always been 5:30 p.m., but there was no written statement. The matter was then referred to the Calendar Subcommittee of the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee for review.

There was no report from the Athletics Committee. Dr. Leathers, however, informed Council that bids on the new Physical Education complex were opened yesterday and that the statements appearing in the newspaper today are somewhat misleading in that the bidding is complex and all alternatives have to be considered. The state capital improvements bill is scheduled for completion in January. The information in the newspaper did not come from University personnel, but from an outside source.

Dr. Taylor said the Campus Facilities Planning Committee had no report.

Miss Nancy Knight reported for the Faculty Rights and Responsibilities Committee, stating that a grievance was received by the committee and assigned file number 1979-80-1. She informed Council that the grievant removed the matter from the committee before deliberations could be completed.

Dr. Saslaw said the Faculty Well-Being Committee had nothing to report.

Dr. Cone, reporting for the Library and Learning Resources Committee, said that the sub-committee for the budget is hard at work and a report will be forthcoming.

Dr. Lehrman asked if the Library and Learning Resources Committee had any report yet on the resolution which had been passed by the Department of English on April 20, 1979 (Minutes of Meeting of University Council, May 10, 1979, printed in The University of Akron Chronicle, June 1, 1979, page 6). (Following the meeting, this information was verified:

1. The Library has passed the minimum Ohio Board of Regents standards for collection, facilities and staff in 1977.
2. The acquisition budget for Library materials for 1979-80 is in excess of \$850,000 which is \$100,000 more than originally planned.
3. Total Library budget for acquisitions, professional faculty, staff and operations is five percent of the instructional general budget expenditures for the current academic year.)

Dr. Berquist, in Dr. Chen's absence, informed Council that the Reference Committee had one meeting. The Chairman indicated the results of that meeting would be discussed under "Old Business."

In Dr. Gent's absence, Dr. Poston read a part of the report on Research, stating that for the first funding period, where the research may be started during the winter break, the committee considered a total of 26 proposals and recommended funding for 18 of them, at a total amount of \$22,959. A further opportunity for submitting proposals for research funding will occur at the start of the spring semester, when another faculty mailing will draw attention again to the availability of research grants from University funds. The committee also considered 14 requests for faculty summer research fellowships, for summer 1980, and recommended that eight fellowships be awarded. The names, titles, and amounts of the successful research grants, and the names of colleagues recommended for faculty summer research fellowships will be printed in the Chronicle.

Dean Hansford had no report from the Student Affairs Committee.

The Chairman told Council that there would be no report from the Akron Representative on the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents since Dr. Vander Ark is in Columbus as a Regents' meeting today. A report can be expected at the January meeting of University Council.

As Akron Representative on the Ohio Faculty Senate, Dr. Lehrman had no report.

Referring to "Old Business" Dr. Leathers announced that the McGucken motion put on the table at the November Council meeting would now be taken up. Dr. McGucken moved that his motion be taken from the table. The motion was seconded and passed.

Dr. Lehrman proposed a substitute motion for Dr. McGucken's motion (printed in the December 1, 1979 Chronicle, page 7), as follows:

"Since Council has already charged the Reference Committee with review of the functions and membership of all Council committees (Chronicle, November 1, 1979, page 4), I move that

1. The Reference Committee be directed to review the Library and Learning Resources Committee first;
2. In its review, it consult past and present members of the Library and Learning Resources Committee, librarians, and interested members of University Council and of the University Faculty;
3. It complete its deliberations on the Library and Learning Resources Committee and report to Council by the March 1980 meeting."

Dr. Bee said the substance of Dr. McGucken's motion, if Dr. Lehrman's substitute passes, will go to the Reference Committee. Whatever comes back from the Reference Committee regarding the functions, etc. of the Library and Learning Resources Committee will then be laid on the table for one month, which follows proper bylaw procedure for amending Council Bylaws. Dr. Lehrman's substitute motion carried with no opposition.

The Chairman called on Dr. Berquist to report for Dr. Chen on the Reference Committee's recommendations on University Council Committees. Dr. Berquist used a projection of the chart which appeared in the December Chronicle to illustrate the percentage (12.3) of teaching faculty representation (by college) on standing committees. In answer to questions, the Chairman explained the method of selection and appointment to committees and stated that first, second and third preferences were honored wherever possible. He said in some instances, however, the Procedural Committee must make the assignments in an effort to maintain representative balance on committees. He said recommendations for changes in committee structure and functions should originate with the committees themselves.

Miss Knight said the Faculty Well-Being and the Faculty Rights and Responsibilities Committees should not be counted in the distribution shown since the members are all elected. Dr. Bee suggested checking the functions of the committees as outlined in the Council Bylaws against the actual functions before any action is taken. Dr. McGucken felt a report from the Reference Committee on functions should come first and not worry about membership until later. Dr. Berquist said the Reference Committee would study committee functions and prepare a report.

Dr. Dye wondered if the three motions introduced by the Reference Committee in November, which were subsequently tabled, were still on the table. The Chairman said "Yes." After some discussion, Dr. Bee moved they be taken off the table. The motion was seconded by Dr. Dye and carried. It was then moved and seconded that the three motions be retabled until the March meeting of Council. Motion carried with no opposition.

The Chairman announced that this is the last Council meeting one of the members will attend—Dean Major will be retiring at the end of this month. The Chairman asked Council's recognition of Dean Coleman J. Major. Council stood and applauded.

Dean Major said he had been a member of Council for a long, long time—since 1964, in fact—and has been through some very trying periods with the University in converting from a municipal to a state institution, in changing from semesters to quarters, in going through the ups and downs of the early '70s, and finally, in changing back again to semesters. He noted that "Council has mellowed and so have I" and thanked his colleagues for their recognition.

The Chairman wished everyone a very happy holiday.

On motion the meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p. m.
