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MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, November 15, 1979

The regular meeting of the University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Vice President Noel Leathers, at 3 p.m. on Thursday, November 15, 1979, in Leigh Hall 307.

Forty-eight of the 67 members of Council (including one ex officio, for 1979-80) were present. Those absent with notice were Mr. Hollis Allan, Dr. H. K. Barker, Dr. C. Carrino, Dr. M. d'Amico, Dr. C. E. Griffin, Dr. A. Krigline, Dr. W. Lehrman, Dr. I. MacGregor, Mr. K. McCormick, Dr. C. Poston, Mr. H. P. Schrank, Mr. Rick Shaw. Others absent were Mr. D. Burrowbridge, Dr. H. Cone, Mr. J. Finan, Miss M. Hiss, Dr. G. Knieter, Dr. C. J. Major, Mr. D. VanDoros.

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the meeting of University Council of October 18, 1979 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of November 1, 1979. Dr. Brittain referred to page 5, the fourth line, and requested that the sentence be corrected to read, "Dr. Brittain did not concur in this view." With this change, the minutes were approved as printed.

The "Remarks of the President" came next on the agenda, and Dr. Guzzetta said that he would first mention the status of the capital improvements bill in the Ohio Legislature. The chairman of the committee, Senator Meshel, had invited most of the state university presidents to appear before the committee to support their list of proposed projects, but Akron had not been requested to go to Columbus. Since nothing has as yet been decided, rumors suggest a decision before Thanksgiving, or after the first of January. Dr. Guzzetta noted that if the bill is not voted on until after the holidays, it could have an adverse effect upon construction of our physical education building since the bids are due on December 6. It would be impossible to award contracts unless Akron is allocated more than the current \$8 million.

The President then reminded the Council that it is customary for the summary of teaching faculty salary ranges to be announced at the November meeting of Council. Although the summary sheets are at this hour in the campus mail to all full-time faculty, he cited the totals. Last year the range was from \$12,000 for instructors to \$35,583 for professors. This year the minimum is \$13,425 for instructors to a maximum of \$37,668 for professors. The same comparisons for compensation (including the 19.4 percent in additional benefits and retirement, etc.) show for last year \$14,318 for instructors to \$43,347 for professors, and this year from \$16,217 to \$44,636. Dr. Guzzetta also observed that Akron compares well with other state universities in salaries. Akron is fourth in the professor category in salary, third for associate professors, and second for assistant professors and instructors.

Dr. Richard Roberts recalled that Akron's three highest ranks from 1972-73 (average) had increased 40 percent, but the consumer price index actually lowered them by 11-12 percent. He wondered how this inequity could be handled.

The President said that the Board and administration were trying to do the best possible within the resources available, and that they hoped to do more in 1980-81 even than this year. It would, however, be difficult to meet the inflation rate, but they would do everything they could. One of the discouraging factors is that the University had overearned \$1,800,000 on the line item, but since eight of the twelve state universities also overearned, the Ohio Board of Regents would probably distribute about ten cents on the dollar for the "over enrollment". Another problem is that the University has certain fixed costs and also has to meet inflated prices in many aspects of its operation. He would welcome any suggestions for combatting the situation. There is another consideration in this year's appropriation bill. This is the provision requiring all universities planning fee increases to absorb the first 7.5 percent of C.P.I. and not raising fees beyond the difference between 7.5 percent and the C.P.I.

Dr. Buchthal inquired if Akron had changed in ranking within the state. Dr. Guzzetta replied that he believed that we were third at the professor level last year.

Mr. Nolte, at the Chairman's invitation, reported on the progress of the campus United Way-Red Cross campaign, which to date stands at \$35,575, or 70 percent of goal. Twenty-eight percent of faculty and staff pledged, although 44 percent responded. Acknowledgements are being sent out, and the campaign on campus is not yet closed.

The Chairman called upon Dr. Bruce Holland to begin the reports of the standing committees with the statement from the Procedural Committee. Dr. Holland said that the committee had met on October 31 to set the agenda for today's Council meeting. The notice of Dr. McGucken's proposed amendment to Addendum to the Bylaws of University Council was also distributed and discussed at some length. One concern was whether the procedure for amending the Bylaws applies to amending the articles in the Addendum to those Bylaws, and whether it is procedurally proper to refer such proposed amendment to the Reference Committee which is currently undertaking a review of the Council's committee system. It was further questioned whether there is a potential conflict between the proposed amendment and the Faculty Manual description of the duties of the University Librarian (based on the Board's Regulations). The Procedural Committee recommended that after Dr. McGucken has had the opportunity to introduce his motion, the last question should be resolved by the Reference Committee before Council's next meeting.

In Dr. Poston's absence, Dr. Watt presented the curricular changes recommended by the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee, as circulated to Council. The first proposal was submitted by the Department of Physical Education to bring its Health Education program up to state certification standards. He moved the approval of ED-80-2. The motion was seconded.

Dr. Faronia questioned the inclusion of course 3150:124 (3 credits) as an alternative to 3150:132-133 (7 credits), in both the 7-12 and K-12 programs. He felt that the correct correlation would have been with 3150:129-130 (4 credits each) in place of 3150:124. He moved to amend the motion to include this substitution. Mr. Jamison seconded the motion to amend, which carried. The amended original motion was put to a vote and carried.

(All course changes will be detailed in the Appendix to these minutes, and are effective September 1980 unless otherwise indicated.)

Dr. Watt moved that the proposal of the College of Business Administration be approved which would add options to satisfy the mathematics requirement for business majors (undergraduate). The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt informed the Council that the proposal from the College of Fine and Applied Arts relative to changes in the Social Work curriculum (FA-80-3) which was included on the summary sheet currently before the Council was temporarily held up pending action by the Graduate Council, since the original request was for graduate credit. The Graduate Council is expected to meet before the next meeting of University Council so that the matter can be brought up then.

Dr. Watt moved that the other proposal from the College of Fine and Applied Arts (FA-80-8) which would formalize a Child Life Specialist Training Program be approved, and to be effective spring semester 1980. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt moved that the changes proposed by the Division of Business and Office Technology in the Community and Technical College be approved, these to incorporate changes in the degree requirements in the Legal Option, International Option and Executive Option. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt moved that the changes proposed by the General College relative to credits in the physical education program in General Studies be approved, reducing the credits from one credit to one-half credit (per subject course). The motion was seconded. Dr. Gerhart observed that one of the courses (1100:133) is a full semester and should continue at one full credit. [The complete list as changed is in the Appendix.] The motion carried.

Dr. Watt then presented the recommendation from the Academic Policies Committee that Article IV, Section 6 of the Bylaws of the Graduate Faculty be amended to read as follows:

"An adjunct faculty member shall be defined as an individual with distinguished scholarly and/or performance credentials, who is performing a specified instructional, consulting, and/or research task for the University, but who retains a full-time position at this or another institution, in industry, or in private practice. The adjunct faculty member usually performs the specified task in a temporary capacity but the nature of the assignment is not necessarily restricted to a single term.

Adjunct faculty members may be appointed to Graduate Faculty membership. Such appointments shall follow the guidelines and procedures of Article IV, Section 2 and Section 5, excluding the requirement of full-time faculty status."

He moved the adoption of the recommendation which was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt then presented the recommendation from the Academic Policies Committee to change the wording under "Grades" on page 17 (beginning with the fifth sentence) of the 1978-79 Graduate Bulletin, and on page 129 of the 1979-80 General Bulletin to read as follows:

"The Dean of Graduate Studies and Research, with the approval of the department head, may dismiss any student who fails to make satisfactory progress toward his/her declared goals or who accumulates 6 semester credits of "C" or below. The accumulation of 6 semester credits of 'F' will result in mandatory dismissal."

He moved the adoption of the recommendation which was a result of consideration requested by Council. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt completed the report from the Academic Policies Committee with its recommendation that the final examination dates remain the same as indicated on the approved University calendar, with the deadline for grades changed to 5 p. m.

Dean Weyrick, who had chaired the subcommittee, read a letter from the Department of Home Economics and Family Ecology requesting an extension of the deadline. Dean Weyrick had discussed the matter with the Registrar who saw no conflict in changing the deadline from noon to 5 p. m. It was explained further that by observing this deadline, it would be possible to have the grades processed by January 7, thus giving the mail registration students three days to make any schedule

changes based on grades, and before open registration. Previously this time factor has not been available and has worked a hardship on those students who registered early. The convenience and fairness to the students was the overriding consideration in making the change only from noon to 5 p. m. These grades are important for the General and Community and Technical Colleges in serving their students appropriately.

It was moved to adopt the recommendation of the Academic Policies Committee that the deadline for fall 1979 grades remain as originally approved, with the exception of the extension of the deadline from noon to 5 p. m. The motion was seconded and carried.

In answer to Dr. Dale Jackson's query as to the limited time given to the faculty for getting in their grades, Dr. Leathers pointed out that this problem over holidays was not overlooked, but the welfare of the students was given first priority.

Dr. Noble was sympathetic to the plight of faculty who have large numbers of students taking exams on Friday, and wondered what would be the penalty for late compliance. Dr. Leathers said there would be a distraught Registrar, distraught students, and additional expense to compensate for the corrections and entries done manually on the computer runs, and the extreme disappointment to those conscientious students affected.

It was Dean DeYoung's suggestion that consideration be given to changing the University calendar to have classes begin before Labor Day to avoid the conflict at the holidays, etc.

Dean Dunlap recalled instances in the past when students were deprived of inclusion on the Dean's List when the grades of some courses were late coming in.

Provost Leathers noted that the new home for the Computer Center is targeted for completion by the beginning of 1981. The only time that this vital operation can be shut down for the move will be the first week in January, so that it is imperative that grades next year be in on time in December.

In response to Dr. Gerhart's reminder that Monday-Wednesday classes are often lost in the instructional days calendar, Dr. Leathers asked that the Academic Policies Calendar Subcommittee look into feasible alternatives for later consideration.

Dr. Taylor reported that the Campus Facilities Planning Committee had met on November 12. They learned from Mr. Duff that the new parking deck should be in operation about February 1, 1980. The committee discussed the subject of litter containers, and Mr. Duff indicated that several more would be placed on campus, particularly on the route from Thomas and Guzzetta Halls to Gardner Student Center. The committee plans to review the suggestions received by last year's committee for improving campus facilities.

Dr. Brittain hoped that the containers could be rectangular to preclude rolling! Dr. Taylor promised to take this into consideration.

The Faculty Well-Being Committee, according to Dr. Saslaw, had met on November 13 with Mr. Duff regarding fringe benefits. Possibility of raising life insurance benefits proportionately with the new salary scales will be investigated.

Mr. Nolte asked if the University of Cincinnati in its recent contract received dental coverage. Dr. Saslaw affirmed this and that it is legal in Ohio (it is liability insurance which cannot be paid by the institutions). Dr. Leathers explained that it is very difficult to choose a good plan; so many publicized are really worthless. Dr. Saslaw said that the committee is still looking into the matter.

Dr. Chen, chairman of the Reference Committee, used projection of a chart to illustrate the representation by colleges on standing committees, and the percentages of teaching faculty on these committees.

Dr. Chen, then on behalf of the Reference Committee, offered three motions:

The first—Each college elects a certain number of representatives in proportion to the faculty size and the Procedural Committee makes the committee assignments from this pool of representatives.

The second—Committee members shall serve overlapping two-year terms so that one-half are selected each year. The committee shall elect its own chairman, who, if not already a member of Council, shall become an ex-officio nonvoting member of Council for reporting purpose only.

The third—Each committee shall pass on its meeting minutes to the next committee.

In discussing the motions, Mr. Jamison felt that they implied the necessity to amend the Council Bylaws and that there were substantive implications. He urged that the motions be stated in the Chronicle for study. He moved to table the motions until the next meeting. The motion was seconded and carried.

When Mr. Nolte inquired about citing the pertinent sections of the Council Bylaws, Provost Leathers reminded the Council that these are all included in the Faculty Documents Loose-Leaf Handbook which all faculty have for easy reference.

Dr. Vander Ark commended the concise presentation of the committee/college representation which Dr. Chen had projected, and requested its inclusion in the next Chronicle. The chart follows:

Dr. Richard Roberts assumed that all the committees would stay the same size as presently.

Dr. Leathers felt that the next meeting of Council should be a working one, and that their conclusions relative to committees could be circulated for consideration by all the faculty later.

To clarify Dr. Noble's concern, it was affirmed that the motion to table was for this time only, and it would be up for discussion in December.

When Dr. McGucken inquired if the Reference Committee had yet considered the functions of each standing committee, Dr. Chen responded that everyone was new on the committee this year, so they were waiting to get a better understanding of the committee responsibilities before proceeding, which they intend to do.

Dr. Gent announced that the Research (Faculty Projects) Committee had met and set the timetable for submission of research grant proposals and this schedule has been sent to all faculty members. November 29 is the deadline for requests for 1980 summer fellowships.

The Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor had met in Columbus on November 14, Dr. Vander Ark reported. He touched briefly on the points discussed, emphasizing the \$1 million proposed for urban centers, particularly at Cleveland State. (His report is included in the Appendix to these minutes.)

Dr. Dye asked for a definition of the urban centers purpose, and Dr. Vander Ark quoted Chancellor Moulton that it was to develop those programs already effective. Dr. Leathers stated that they were an outgrowth of Regents' urban doctoral programs encouraged three years ago, concentrated at Akron, CWRW, Cleveland State, and Kent, with Akron taking the leadership.

Under "Old Business" Mr. Nolte expressed concern again about assignments for rooms for exams for those students who take courses once a week. There has apparently been conflict with assignments with classes given more frequently. Dr. Leathers expected a more sensitive scheduling next year.

Dr. McGucken introduced the proposed amendment to the Addendum to the Bylaws of University Council, as circulated to the members of Council: that the two paragraphs appearing under "Library and Learning Resources Committee" in the Addendum (on Functions of Permanent Committees of University Council) to the Bylaws of the University Council (p. 8) be replaced by the following:

"Formulates, and supervises the implementation of, the general policies of the university library including those on acquisitions, operations, budget, and space utilization.

"Reports to University Council regularly.

"Its members shall be: The Provost (Chairman), the University Librarian, the Dean of the Graduate School, and, from the members of University Council, three faculty and one student, to be elected annually by the new Council at its first meeting. The Committee shall elect one of its faculty members as secretary. The secretary shall maintain minutes of Committee meetings and shall present a report at each meeting of University Council."

He felt that faculty and students have a lot to contribute to the operation of the university and need greater input. He moved that the proposed amendment be adopted, but first laid on the table. The motion to table was seconded and carried.

On motion the meeting was adjourned at 4:05 p.m.

The following curriculum changes, in accordance with the Curricula Change Process adopted by University Council on December 12, 1974, have had final approval by the Vice President and Provost, or through specific vote by University Council, all effective September 1980 (unless otherwise noted):

Drop	5570:321	<u>Organization and Administration of School Health.</u> 2 credits.
	5570:322	<u>Methods and Materials in Teaching Health Education.</u> 3 credits.
Add	5570:200	<u>Current Topics in Health Education.</u> 3 credits. This course is designed to give teachers of health education the knowledge base necessary to deal factually and comfortably with selected topics in school and community health.
	5570:201	<u>Consumer Health, Weight Control and Exercise.</u> 3 credits. The student will investigate current consumer health problems as they relate to making decisions about the purchase and use of health products and health services available in today's society. An understanding of the maintenance of body weight and how it is affected by a person's knowledge of nutrition and exercise will be included.
	5570:202	<u>Stress, Life-Style, and Your Health.</u> 3 credits. Stress, Life Style and Your Health will overview the behavior associated with wellness and disease.
	5570:321	<u>Organization and Administration of School Health and School Health Services.</u> 4 credits. This course will involve the various methods and techniques utilized in the organization and administration of the school health program. Additionally, the role of school and community personnel in detecting and managing the health problems of students will be explored. The third area of emphasis will be the procedures and programs designed to protect and promote the health of school-age youth.
	5570:322	<u>Methods and Materials of Elementary School Health Education.</u> 2 credits. Prerequisite, 5570:101. This course will emphasize the planning and organization of subject matter for implementation in the elementary school health curriculum. Emphasis will be on creative activities and teaching methods.
	5570:323	<u>Methods and Materials of Secondary School Health Education.</u> 2 credits. Prerequisite, 5570:101. The planning and organization of subject matter for the secondary school health instruction will be the major emphasis of the course. Attention will be given to the development of teaching techniques, utilization of instructional media, and evaluation procedures in health education.

REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF AKRON REPRESENTATIVE TO THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE CHANCELLOR OF THE OHIO BOARD OF REGENTS—Dr. Sherman Vander Ark

Meeting of November 14, 1979

The Faculty Advisory Committee (FAC) met with Chancellor Moulton on November 14, 1979, to discuss the following issues:

HB-171 (Freedom of Choice Bill): This bill is being proposed to have the OBR establish and administer a student grant program for undergraduate students not in a state university or college.

The Capital Improvements Bill: This bill is receiving hearings before the Senate Finance Committee.

A Testing Bill (no number given): This bill is in the House and says any person has the right to examine the results of his standardized, national test score. It provides for that person to know the answers he has missed and why he has missed them.

OBR Meeting: Several items on the OBR meeting agenda scheduled for November 16, 1979, were explained by the Chancellor. These items included consideration of:

- 1) New degree programs for a Master of Humanities at the Ohio State University and Wright State University, and Certificates of Authorization for the R. E. M. Institute, Doctor of Behavioral Science and Doctor of Psychology.
- 2) Distribution of one million dollars for urban university center funding.

FAC Membership: An alternate plan to Dr. Moulton's plan announced in August, 1979, was unanimously approved by FAC and sent to Dr. Moulton for his consideration. This plan was initiated by William Gump (Miami University) and provides for 25 FAC members. The "Gump Plan" gives full membership to the state universities and community colleges, and gives rotating memberships to the technical schools and branches.

FAC Offices: Richard Boyer (University of Toledo) was reelected as president; William Gump was elected as vice president; and Stuart Givens was reelected as secretary.

The next meeting of the FAC is to be held on December 13, 1979.
