MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

She noted the gratifying development of the undergraduate and graduate programs and the anticipation of the move into the new Mary E. Gladwin Hall, which will be dedicated late in 1979.

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MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, February 22, 1979

The regular meeting of University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Vice President Noel Leathers, at 3:05 p.m. on Thursday, February 22, 1979, in Leigh Hall 307.

Fifty-three of the 68 members of Council (including one ex officio, for 1978-79) were present. Those absent with notice were Dr. D. Buchthal, Dr. H. Cone, Dr. A. Fatemi, Dr. A. Gent, Dr. C. E. Griffin, Dr. D. J. Guzzetta, Miss N. Knight, Dr. I. MacGregor, Mr. J. Mercer, Dr. W. Rogers, and Mr. W. Wolf. Others absent were Miss L. Ayers, Mr. R. Kendall, Mr. D. Robinson, and Dr. H. Slaughter.

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the meeting of University Council on February 1, 1979 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of February 7, 1979. Since there were no additions or corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

The President was off campus attending a non-University Board meeting, so Dr. Leathers proceeded to call for the reports of the Standing Committees. Dr. Schultz announced that the Procedural Committee had met on February 13 to organize the agenda for today's Council meeting. Mr. Jamison had notified them that the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor would not meet prior to February 22, so that he requested the deletion of that item from the current agenda. Also, there would be no meeting of the Ohio Faculty Senate as yet, and that notice was also deleted for February 22.

Speaking for the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee, Dr. Poston referred to the document circulated to Council from the Committee and stated that several of the changes approved would require specific Council action. [All of these curriculum details appear in the Appendix to these minutes.] Under FA-79-5 from the Department of Music, he moved the approval of the proposed option in Jazz Studies in the degree of Bachelor of Music. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Poston cited the proposal, CT-79-8 concerning changes in degree requirements for the associate degree in Business Management Technology, and moved their adoption. The motion was seconded and carried.

Under proposal CT-79-9, to change the Real Estate Option in Business Management Technology to the degree, Associate of Applied Science in Real Estate, Dr. Poston moved this approval. The motion was seconded. Dean Weyrick explained that this was within the guidelines from the Ohio Board of Regents and would not require specific action in Columbus. The motion was put to a vote and carried.

Dr. Poston moved that the proposal in CT-79-10 to provide a Banking Option in Business Management Technology be approved. The motion was seconded and carried.

Consideration of the proposal CT-79-21 from the Division of Allied Health Technology, which had been circulated, was temporarily postponed at the Division's request, Dr. Poston reported.

Again, speaking on behalf of the Academic Policies Committee, Dr. Poston moved that the 1979-80 University calendar, which must be adopted by February, be approved as circulated previously to the Council. The motion was seconded.

Dr. Richard Roberts observed that the date of Founders Day and May Day in 1980 had not been included as the committee had discussed. Dr. Leathers said that the second Tuesday in February had been suggested (February 12, 1980), which would balance the classes which might not be held on May Day (always a Friday in May). He recommended a Council vote on the calendar in general, and then on the designation of Founders Day.

Miss Cool, president of the Student Bar Association, claimed that the law students were unhappy with this calendar as there were no days off except the Thanksgiving weekend in the fall semester, and they therefore lacked the opportunity for additional study which the spring recess provided. She moved to amend the proposed 1979-80 calendar to have classes start one week before Labor Day, and to conclude one week earlier so that there would be an extra week for study before examinations in December. Dr. Gerlach seconded the motion.

Dr. Drennon could understand the necessity of consideration of Labor Day in scheduling, and also the desire of the Law School, but he felt that their programs were unique and conforming to their suggestion would be unfair to the majority of the University's students.

Dr. Gerlach opined that the extra time for study would benefit all students, not just those in Law.

It was Dr. Gerhart's feeling that it was more important to provide instructional days than to have more time for study for examinations.

The amendment was put to a vote and failed.

Dr. Gerlach recalled that last year's calendar included the dates when examination grades were due and he thought this might be helpful, especially over the holidays, but he also wondered if the dates were to be included at all.

The Provost reminded the Council that grades are always due 48 hours after the examination, but it was Dr. Gerlach's prerogative to request Academic Policies to consider if he wished.

The motion to adopt the 1979-80 University calendar was put to a vote and carried. (It appears in Appendix to these minutes.)

Dr. Gerlach moved that the Academic Policies Subcommittee consider the question of including a "grade due" date, and its determination.

Dr. Roberts moved that the Council accept as a general policy the establishment of the second Tuesday in February as date for Founders Day and that it be included with the calendar for reference. The motion was seconded.

It was Dr. Dye's concern that some faculty members do not abide by the schedule for classes to be held on Founders Day, and he felt that no classes should be individually cancelled within the regular framework. He advocated publishing the hours if possible.

The motion to establish Founders Day as the second Tuesday in February was put to a vote and carried, with the request that hours of classes to be held (or cancelled) be included if possible.

Dr. Poston then reported on the recommendation from the Academic Policies Committee which had considered, at the request of Council, the advisability of adding an "A+" grade to the official grading system. The Committee recommended that the present scale be maintained.

Dr. Taylor, opining that this seemed unfair, having no "A+" to counter the "A-", moved to eliminate the present "A-". The motion was seconded.

Mr. Dressler felt that the "A-" was more descriptive, and Dr. Faron thought its elimination would distort the grading system. Dr. Gerhart advocated a grading system which had a continuous scale with equal steps.

In response to Miss Cool's query as to an estimate of the number of faculty using the plus/minus grading, it was assumed to be about 70 percent, which she then stated seemed unfair to those students not coming under this method from certain professors.

Dr. Gerhart noted that the Law School is in the minority and its preferences should not dictate to the entire campus. Professor Allan observed that Miss Cool didn't speak for all those in Law. He considered grading an art and not a science, and nobody can always be entirely accurate, and he suggested dropping the matter.

Upon Dr. Barker's call for the question, the substitute motion was put to a vote and defeated.

Dr. Poston's report from the Academic Policies Committee was therefore accepted by the Council.

Dr. McGucken deferred to Mr. Schrank for a report on the University Library. The Librarian told Council that the budget for library materials would remain the same as last year—\$750,000. There will be only \$450,000 allocated for serials, which is lower this year, and will perhaps create a hardship because of the "hunger" for serials. Dr. Leathers explained that the cost of serials has been escalating 15-20 percent annually, so that the budget cannot cover as formerly.

Dr. Roberts inquired if some of the costs could be charged back to individual departments. Mr. Schrank said that some could be, but many are "core" and have general application. Efforts are being made, however, to work through departments.

Dr. Gent, who could not be present, had submitted his report to the Provost. Dr. Leathers told the Council that the Research (Faculty Projects) Committee had met on February 20 and 22 to consider 31 applications for support. Twenty-four awards have been made, totaling \$27,644. The next review period will be scheduled for the fall 1979 semester. Some of the current awards are subject to approval for protection of human subjects. Dr. Leathers commended his colleagues for their research efforts. He said that the list of these awards will be included in the Appendix to the minutes of the February 22 Council meeting and he urged the faculty to read it.

Dr. McGucken inquired whether it would be possible for the faculty to have available the types of research which each of the faculty will do as 1979 summer research fellows, and while on professional leave next academic year. The Provost said it could be arranged.

Dr. Holland thought that Dr. Gerlach's motion last meeting to change Section 16 of Article B of the Faculty Manual had been treated too briefly (it was voted down overwhelmingly), and he wished to bring the matter up again in a different way. Dr. Holland noted that Dr. Gerlach was raising the question of ambiguity in the language in the 1973 statement. He had gone back through the Chronicles from 1973 and noted the ambiguity of the language as to "shalls" and "shoulds". He wondered if Council wanted rules so mandated as to be too flexible and not definite about promotions, etc. He then moved that "Council consider Section 16 of Article B of the Faculty Manual to decide whether any of its present guidelines be mandated, and whether college and department rules can be regarded as binding procedures in the absence of nonbinding University guidelines." The motion was seconded.

Dean Samad pointed out that departments and colleges have adopted their own guidelines which they use. He thought that the motion assumed that these matters had not had earlier consideration.

Mr. Jamison felt that the University Council was usually well informed, and on this matter it should study the aspects and report back.

Dr. Gerlach referred to a recent legal opinion which held that in that instance the plaintiff was not bound by this Section. He said departments should be required to have their own guidelines, and he was bothered that the Section had been interpreted as not mandatory when he thought the original document was meant to be mandatory, and he wanted it reconsidered.

Mr. Finan opined that this was not within the scope of the Reference Committee in this regard, and suggested that it be referred to the Academic Policies Committee.

The Council by consensus referred the matter to the Academic Policies Committee.

The Provost wished the Council a happy Washington's birthday as the group was adjourned at 3:55 p. m.
