MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, April 17, 1980

The regular meeting of the University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Vice President Noel L. Leathers, at 3 p.m. on Thursday, April 17, 1980.

Forty-eight of the 68 members of Council (including one ex officio, for 1979-80) were present. Those absent with notice were Dr. J. Bee (on professional leave this spring), Dr. C. Carrino, Dr. H. Cone, Miss D. Dobrindt, Dr. J. Dunlap, Dr. C. E. Griffin, Dr. D. Guzzetta, Dean R. Hansford, Dr. A. Krigline, Dr. A. Noble (on professional leave this spring), Dr. C. Poston, Interim Dean A. Rakas, Mr. H. P. Schrank, Dr. A. Sentieri, Dr. D. VanDervort. Others absent were Mr. J. Lytle, Mr. W. Medley, Mr. T. Parks, Mr. R. Shaw, and Mr. D. Van Doros.

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the meeting of University Council of March 20, 1980 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of April 1, 1980. There were two errors: on page 13, under "Department of History", the reference number should have read "AS-80-19"; and on page 31, under "General College", this sentence should be added at the end of the description of 1800:100, "All grades will be credit/noncredit." With these corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

Dr. Leathers noted that the President was out of town, but he read the communication which he had sent to the Chairman of University Council:

April 4, 1980

To the Chairman, University Council:

This will acknowledge receipt of your communication of March 31, 1980 wherein you transmitted Council legislation regarding a proposed amendment to the University Council Bylaws, Article III Composition of the Council.

Pursuant to Article II of the Council's Bylaws, I am pleased to endorse the concept that the President appoint an ex officio nonvoting retired University of Akron faculty member to Council. May I suggest that an appropriate statement to that effect be added to Article III, Section b.

Please advise University Council that this legislation will hereby become effective on May 15, 1980 and that I will appoint an appropriate retired faculty member to Council in an ex officio and nonvoting capacity for 1980-81.

Regards.

Dean Barker moved that Council accept the President's letter. The motion was seconded and carried. Dr. Leathers said that the Bylaws of Council would be amended to incorporate the new wording.

Dr. Watt, on behalf of Dr. Poston, who was out of town, presented the list of potential graduates for the May 1980 Commencement and moved that the list of all candidates (with the addendum), then before Council, for degrees at the May 1980 Commencement be approved without addition, pending completion of all requirements, approval by their respective collegiate faculties, and approval by the University Board of Trustees. The motion was seconded and carried.

Proceeding to the reports of the standing committees, Dr. Leathers called upon Dr. Bruce Holland who stated that the Procedural Committee had met on April 8 to draw up the agenda for today's meeting. The group had approved Dr. Grunberg's request to have permission to speak at today's meeting and had endorsed a committee of 19 as the University Council's Ad Hoc Committee on the United Way—one representative each from the degree-granting Colleges, Administration, Planning, University Relations, Library and Physical Plant; and two each from Student Affairs, Business and Finance, and Staff Personnel. Dr. Holland announced the membership as follows: Arts and Sciences, Dr. W. A. Francis; Engineering, Dr. B. T. Chung; Education, Dr. Robert Ferguson; Business Administration, Dr. Howard Taylor; Fine and Applied Arts, Mr. Earl Ertman; Nursing, Mrs. Joan Baumgardner; Law, Mr. Paul Richert; Community and Technical, Mr. John Mumper; Administration, Dr. C. A. Carrino; Planning, Mr. Donald Bowles; University Relations, Miss Alberta Hensley; Library, Mr. David Brink; Physical Plant, Mr. Thomas Gallagher; Student Affairs, Mr. Jay Hershey and Mrs. Karen Moseley; Business and Finance, Mrs. Linda Rohrbough and Mr. Eugene Stephens; Staff Personnel, Mr. Robert Bossar and Mrs. Carol Whitmire.

Speaking for the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee, Dr. Watt referred to the recommendations of the committee for curricular changes as circulated currently and before the Council. He moved that ED-80-12 (changes in Secondary Education to implement an undergraduate teacher education curriculum redesign) be approved by the Council although there was one objection outstanding which had not been resolved. In answer to a query, he said that the objection pertained to eight one-hour courses.

Dr. Saslaw stated that we are now under state mandate (419) to require 600 hours of student teaching, and she saw no inconsistency in this program as presented.

Mr. Mercer opined that the courses were not offered frequently enough to permit students to fill their requirements within specified years.

Dr. Dye noted, on the chart of courses, that there are offerings from other departments besides Secondary Education, and Dr. Saslaw explained the necessity of field based experience which is broader than clinical experience only.

After further discussion and Dr. Dye's assurance that students have been receiving ample information about these changes, the question was called.

The motion to approve the changes in ED-80-12 was put to a vote and carried.

[All curriculum changes are included in the Appendix to these minutes.]

Dr. Watt then moved that FA-80-15 (change in credit hours for the B.F.A. program to comply with guidelines of the National Association of Schools of Art) be approved. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Watt moved that GC-80-3 (courses in the Center for Environmental Studies) be approved pending approval by the Graduate Council. The motion was seconded.

Dean Gent felt that the questions raised about the proposal concerned related courses already offered elsewhere, and were sufficiently substantive to postpone for further consideration. He moved to table this action until after Graduate Council acts. The motion was seconded.

Dean Ruebel reminded the Council that the General College is only the mechanism for presentation of the courses and does not represent the Graduate Faculty.

Dr. Brittain observed that such a motion could not be tabled since this is the last regular meeting of University Council for 1979-80.

Mr. Jamison said that as a member of Graduate Council he felt the concerns were real and substantive and that if the motion is tabled, it will end the matter until it is brought back in a later Council.

The motion to table was put to a vote and carried.

Dr. Watt noted that the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee at its April 8 meeting adopted a statement, not substantive, but a further interpretation of present rules regarding curricular proposals for next year, which he read to Council: "All curricular proposals in both long and short form when circulated must be open for objections no fewer than 15 class days following date of circulation."

He added that Dr. Poston and he have always followed this policy, but this is a guarantee for future usage, and is announced here for informational purposes only.

As a follow-up to instructions from University Council at its March meeting, the Academic Policies Subcommittee, according to Dr. Watt, submits the following revised wording to substitute for the resolution presented last month:

"Emeriti may teach part-time on both the graduate and undergraduate level on a term-by-term basis beyond the age of 70 provided that there is an actual need for their services and provided that they are recommended by the department faculty, the department head and the dean of the college."

Mr. Jamison questioned the substitution of "emeriti" for "retired" which latter term had been preferred in March.

Dr. Watt responded that it was the judgment of the subcommittee that "emeriti" was preferable because of the significance of that earned title (generally given, Dr. Leathers added, after ten years' service at the University and recommendation through normal channels). This statement did not permit the use of others from the community in the older category.

Dr. Gerhart felt that there were valuable people in the community whose experience, despite their own retirement, could contribute substantially in the classroom.

Dr. Leathers remarked that the Bylaws and Regulations of the Board of Trustees do not restrict outsiders. In response to Mr. Mercer's question, Dr. Leathers said that in practice the age 70 applies to everyone, campus and off-campus. He also reminded Council that the phased-down teaching policy adopted last November by the Board was in compliance with state law.

Mr. Nolte wondered how "actual need" was determined, and with declining enrollment anticipated, if this would work against the hiring of younger faculty, with consequent inbreeding.

Dr. McGucken inquired whether this statement on teaching beyond 70 would appear in the Faculty Manual. Dr. Leathers said this was only a resolution, and not for incorporation in the Faculty Manual. Any substantive change would have to be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. McGucken advocated some further directive which would take it to the Board's attention.

Mr. Finan in his comments thought that the current language doesn't preclude being rehired after retirement.

Mr. Nolte moved to table consideration of this new resolution so that the authors might present it at the first fall meeting of Council with more recommendations for further action. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Jamison observed that the Council can always ask the Board to reconsider a policy about teaching beyond 70. He hoped that this resolution would not be adopted today until there was further consideration of emeriti, retired, and those from the community. It was reaffirmed that tabling this motion today would end it for this Council's year.

Following open discussion and a straw vote taken by the Chair, Council voted to table the motion.

As a matter of information, Dr. Watt announced that the baccalaureate program in cytotechnology which was approved last month, also meant the phasing out of the current two-year associate program in cytotechnology.

The University Council, noting that this would have been his last regular meeting of University Council, voted unanimously to express its warm appreciation to Dr. Charles Poston for his many years of dedicated service to the Council, especially on its Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee, and to wish him well as he returns to the classroom on his administrative retirement this August and to welcome his counsel in the future.

Continuing with the reports of standing committees, the Chairman called upon Dr. Barker for the Athletics Committee. He said that the two replacements who had been named for Assistant Basketball Coaches are Mr. James D. Robinson and Mr. W. C. Chupil.

Dr. Taylor reported that the Campus Facilities Planning Committee had met on April 14 and considered some of the suggestions received by last year's committee for improving campus facilities. There will be additional discussion at the meeting planned for April 28. The Committee hopes to make available a summary of its findings.

Dr. Chen for the Reference Committee referred to the report which was mentioned in March and then later circulated to the members of University Council at the request of Dr. McGucken, so that it could be discussed with more understanding at the April meeting. It follows:

On the Functions of the

March 20, 1980

We all recognize that the Library and Learning Resources (LLR) Committee is one of the most important committees on the campus. As stated in the University Council Bylaws, the Committee is to serve as an advisory group to the University Librarian, to express the faculty will in the growth and development of the academic support which the library supplies, and to provide the Librarian with guidelines and advice on acquisitions, budget, policy and other matters affecting academic areas.

In order to discharge its assignment of reviewing the LLR Committee functions, the Reference Committee had discussions with eleven faculty members who had served on that Committee the last three years. We also met with the University Librarian and three of his staff to solicit their views on the LLR Committee. On the basis of these meetings and discussions, the Reference Committee presents this report.

The majority of the faculty whom we talked to expressed to a certain degree concern about the interaction between the Committee and the University Librarian. The following examples were often cited:

- (1) The Committee was not initially invited to participate in the Bierce building expansion plan.
- (2) The Committee was not initially consulted on the proposed move to the Science and Technology Library.
- (3) The faculty role in the budget allotments to periodicals versus book purchases has been negligible.
- (4) The learning aspect of the LLRC has been neglected.
- (5) The faculty are not being solicited for advice on issues of substance and are not always listened to.

From the Librarian's point of view, the problems like Bierce building expansion and the proposed move of the Science and Technology Library are in the domain of the Librarian's administrative function and the Librarian should have a certain degree of authority and prerogative to carry out its charge.

In the dictionary, the word "advisory" means "having the power to advise". However, the University Council Bylaws do not stipulate how the LLR Committee should exercise this power to advise or how often it should provide such advice and guidelines. On the duty of the University Librarian, the Faculty Manual states in part, "The University Librarian acts as administrative head of the Library.... He or she selects, with the advice of the faculty, the books, periodicals and other materials to be purchased by the Library...." The second sentence quoted above is the only sentence in the job description of the University Librarian which relates to the working relation between the Librarian and the faculty. Therefore, the problems the faculty expressed in talking to the Reference Committee arise from the difference in expectation caused by the ambiguous statement on the interaction between the Librarian and the faculty.

The Library staff and the faculty both agree that the current make-up of the Committee is not representative of each discipline on the campus. Both groups call for a different selection procedure of the Committee members which will assure more equitable representation from each discipline, if not each college.

Finally, the Committee considered Dr. McGucken's proposed amendment to the Bylaws of University Council on the Functions of Library and Learning Resources Committee as printed on The University of Akron Chronicle, December 1, 1979, page 4.

The first paragraph of the proposed amendment reads as follows: "Formulates, and supervises the implementation of, the general policies of the University Library, including those on acquisitions, operations, budget, and space utilization." As much as the Reference Committee members share Dr. McGucken's conviction that the faculty should play an active role in the general policies of the University Library, we find that the proposed amendment as it stands poses a potential conflict to the Faculty Manual description of the duties of the University Librarian.

Dr. Chen then read the following statement, resulting from a follow-up meeting of the Reference Committee:

The Reference Committee proposes that the two paragraphs appearing under "Library and Learning Resources Committee" in the Addendum to the Bylaws of the University Council be replaced by the following:

Serve as an advisory group to the University Librarian to express the faculty will in the growth and development of the academic support which the Library supplies.

Provide the Librarian with guidelines and advice on acquisitions, budget, policy and other matters affecting academic areas through bimonthly meetings with the University Librarian. The Committee shall report these matters to the University Council regularly.

The Committee shall consist of the Provost, one elected member from each College and the Computer Center and one student. The Provost shall be an ex officio member of the Committee and members shall serve overlapping two-year terms so that one-half are elected each year. The Committee shall elect its own Chairman who, if not already a member of Council, shall become an ex officio nonvoting member of Council for reporting purposes only.

It was Mr. Nolte's opinion that this would take the responsibility for the appointment of this Committee away from the Procedural Committee.

Dr. Leathers thought that it would thus be constituted similarly to the Faculty Rights and the Faculty Well-Being Committees.

Dr. McGucken, upon inquiry, was advised that if action was not taken on this matter at today's meeting, it would be possible to call a special meeting before the new Council is constituted.

Mr. Jamison observed that certain other sections of the University Council Bylaws would have to be changed also, if the motion were passed.

Dr. Holland inquired whether the Reference Committee did in fact intend that the LLRC be selected by ballot, as is the case for the Faculty Rights and the Faculty Well-Being Committees. The answer was in the affirmative.

Dean Rogers wondered if there was any relationship between this LLRC and the Computer Based Education area. Dr. Leathers said there was not in this instance.

Dr. Barker asked if one of the elected members to Council from the College of Education could not then be designated to serve on this LLRC.

Mr. Jamison, citing Article VIII of the Council Bylaws, questioned whether it was proper to continue with the discussion at today's meeting.

When Dr. McGucken advocated the addition of the University Librarian to the Committee, it was pointed out by Mr. Nolte that the Committee was to advise the Librarian.

Since the matter would die without action at today's meeting, the Provost took a vote of the Council and the result was 20 to 15 for a special meeting to consider final action on this proposal. The date was set for Tuesday, May 6, at 3 p.m. in Leigh 307.

Dr. Gent, for the Research (Faculty Projects) Committee, announced that one additional summer research fellowship had been granted, making a total of nine this summer.

Dean Hansford, who had been expected to give a report on Enrollment and Housing, was out of the city. The Chairman hoped that this could be presented in May.

Dr. Vander Ark, the Akron Representative on the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents, said that the Chancellor was out of the country and the next meeting was scheduled for April 29.

Dr. Leathers then described the work of the Regents Subcommittee on Formula Revision and answered questions from the Council. He concluded his comments with the warning that the state income has been lower than expected and it may be necessary for the state budget to be reduced three percent across the board by August, thus affecting all university budgets adversely this summer.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

The following curriculum changes, in accordance with the Curricula Change Process adopted by University Council on December 12, 1974, have had final approval by the Vice President and Provost, or through specific vote by University Council, all effective September 1980 (unless otherwise noted):

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Department of Secondary Education
