MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, December 4, 1980

The regular meeting of University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Senior Vice President Noel Leathers, at 3 p.m. on Thursday, December 4, 1980 in Leigh 307.

Fifty-six of the 71 members of Council (including four ex officio for 1980-81) were present. Those absent with notice were Dr. A. Gent, Dr. H. R. Grant, Dr. H. Greene, Dr. D. J. Guzzetta, Dr. A. Krigline, Dr. I. MacGregor, Dr. W. McGucken, and Dr. Ruth Roberts. Others absent were Mr. C. Dressler, Mrs. M. Gipson, Dr. J. Gwinn, Dr. G. Knieter, Mr. T. Morin, Dr. D. Timmerman, and Mr. D. VanDoros.

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the regular meeting of University Council of November 6, 1980 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of December 1, 1980. Hearing no objections, the Chairman declared the minutes approved.

Because President Guzzetta was unable to attend the meeting, Dr. Leathers proceeded with the other agenda items. He first announced that the School of Law faculty had voted to amend the description of one course (LS-81-4) and to change credit hours in another course and to combine two courses (LS-81-5). These, according to University Council procedures, are hereby reported and will be included in the Appendix to the minutes of this Council meeting.

The Chairman then called upon Dr. Bruce Holland to report for the Procedural Committee as the first of the standing committees. He said that the Procedural Committee had met on November 25 to set the agenda for today's meeting, and had appointed two faculty members to serve on the Library and Learning Resources Committee during the spring semester 1981 in place of two who will be on leave: Dr. Robert H. Jones, vice Dr. H. Roger Grant; and Dr. Jolita Kavaliunas, vice Mr. Elton A. Glaser. The Committee had also authorized Dr. Emile Grunberg to attend today's Council meeting and to speak on one of the proposals if he chose to do so.

Since Dr. Watt was delayed in reaching the meeting, the next report was for the Faculty Well-Being Committee and was given by Dr. Lawrence Focht substituting for Dr. Greene who was out of town. The Committee had met on November 21, with special guest, Mr. Michael Sermersheim, Director of Student University Legal Programs. Of primary interest to the Committee was Ohio Senate Bill No. 76, effective March 13, 1980, which now provides certain types of liability insurance coverage and/or immunity from civil action for all state employees. Although college representatives will hopefully report details back to their respective faculties, it was the Committee's recommendation that the University Legal Services prepare a special synopsis to be distributed to each faculty and staff member. The next meeting is scheduled for mid-December with STRS as the topic, and the resource person being Mrs. Faith Helmick, Director of Academic Personnel Services.

Dr. Focht, chairman of the Library and Learning Resources Committee, then announced that the group had met on November 18, and heard reports from the Budget Subcommittee and the Collection Development Subcommittee. The former will begin consideration of the 1981-82 library budget allocations in February. The Collection Development Subcommittee is getting background information. The committee approved in principle the idea that a form for Rationale for New Serial Subscriptions be adopted and made several suggestions as to items to be included. The form would be completed by faculty or library staff recommending new serial acquisitions. Dr. Focht added that the committee would be glad to transmit any suggestions or recommendations to the library staff.

Because Dr. Gent was en route to a conference in Australia, Dr. Leathers read the report from the Research (Faculty Projects) Committee, which had reviewed 28 applications for Faculty Research Grants and 12 applications for Summer Research Fellowships. The committee recommended the

award of 19 research grants for a total amount of \$28,334.77, and seven Summer Research Fellowships. The general standard of the proposals received was high but the funds available to the committee did not allow a greater level of support. A second review of applications for research grants is scheduled for February 1981. Faculty members who wish to have their proposals considered at that time should contact the Research Office for further information. [The list of the currently awarded Research grants appears in the Appendix to these minutes.]

Dr. Watt was then called upon to report for the Academic Policies, Curriculum and Calendar Committee. He said that there were two curricular changes which had not been discussed by the whole committee, and since no objections had been raised, he moved to consider them then. The motion was seconded and carried. He then presented proposal CT-81-02 which was to establish an Industrial Supervision Option in the Manufacturing Technology Program in the Community and Technical College, to be effective with the fall semester 1981. It is in effect a "repackaging" of existing courses into a program less technically oriented than the Manufacturing Technology program and more technically oriented than the Business Management Technology program. He moved its approval. The motion was seconded and carried. [Details in the Appendix to these minutes.]

Dr. Watt next moved that the proposal NU-81-3 from the College of Nursing be approved. This would delete 8200:698 Research Option II (non-thesis). The motion was seconded. In response to Mr. Jamison's query about the proposal, Dean DeYoung explained that the College favored a mandatory thesis requirement. [The 8200:699 Thesis is still required for four credits.] The motion to approve was carried.

Dr. Watt moved that the proposed five-year calendars 1981-86 be taken from the table. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Taylor voiced his concern that some students might be unjustly penalized in having to leave summer employment before the Labor Day weekend, since the 1981-82 and 1982-83 calendars require classes to begin August 31 and August 30, respectively.

Dr. Stuyvesant feared that the notation of classes ending at 5 p.m. on the day before Thanksgiving would mean the cancellation of 4:30 p.m. classes. Dr. Leathers explained that any class beginning prior to 5 p.m. had to be completed as usual. He also noted that after the 1981-82 and 1982-83 academic years, classes would begin after Labor Day.

It was moved that the calendars for 1981-82 and 1982-83 be approved, and those for 1983-84, 1984-85 and 1985-86 be approved in principle. The motion was seconded and carried. [These calendars are included in the Appendix to the minutes of this meeting.]

Dr. Vander Ark informed the Council that the November and December meetings of the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents were combined into one meeting to be held on December 8, so that he had no report for today.

Dr. Watt moved to take the proposed amendment to University Council Bylaws off the table. The motion was seconded and carried. This proposal read: "To add to Article III, Section b. the words 'and Wayne General and Technical College' immediately following the words 'Community and Technical' and before the parenthesis."

Dr. Bee suggested that if the motion's intent was to add representation of Wayne General and Technical College on Council, then full-time teaching faculty should also be added in accordance with the standard formula in Article IV d.

Dr. Leathers suggested that this could be discussed by the Procedural Committee relative to bringing it formally to Council.

Dr. Stuyvesant moved to table the motion to vote on the amendment to the University Council Bylaws until the Procedural Committee could present a recommendation on Wayne College faculty representation on Council. The motion was seconded.

Dr. Watt felt that the Dean should be qualified to sit and vote on Council while the other matter was being resolved. Dr. Bee thought maintaining the balanced membership of Council was more important. Dr. Leathers observed that under Council provisions, Wayne College would be entitled to two representatives at this time.

When it was suggested that the pending amendment might be expanded to include the faculty, the Chairman pointed out that this would have to wait another month since it would involve a further Bylaw amendment.

Dr. Stuyvesant then withdrew his motion to table the amendment.

Dr. Bee moved to amend the pending motion on the University Council Bylaws to include faculty representatives from Wayne General and Technical College, such amendment to read, "and to add to Article III, Section c., the words, 'including Wayne General and Technical College' following the opening words of the section, 'Elected members from the degree-granting college faculties'." The motion was seconded and carried.

He then moved to lay the motion on the table until the next meeting of the Council. It was seconded and carried.

Dr. Stuyvesant moved to take the other two items from the table, the first being the proposed recommendation to be transmitted from University Council to University Board of Trustees to add a paragraph to Division A. Article III, Section 7 of the Regulations of the Board of Trustees to read, "Retired faculty members as well as other qualified persons may be given part-time teaching contracts after they have attained the age of 70." The other item was the proposed recommendation to be transmitted from University Council to the University Board of Trustees to amend the section of the Appendix to the Regulations of the Board of Trustees which is entitled, "Limited Teaching for Teaching Faculty Who Retire", by adding the word "Early" at the end of the above title. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Bruce Holland asked to speak to the first proposal relative to the age 70 question. Favoring the principle of nondiscrimination against age, and recognizing the University's need for occasional employment of someone outside the regular faculty, he recognized potential problems (e.g. how need would be measured; whether this would be a precedent for other personnel such as clerical and maintenance employees; might not such part-time employment preempt hiring of new blood, etc.) but did not consider these as overriding the basic principle at issue.

Dr. d'Amico spoke in favor of the amendment, citing instances where a distinguished professor might be interested in a short-time appointment, etc. He noted that the Board could always refuse to appoint a person.

Dr. Leathers emphasized that the wording was "may", which left the matter to the discretion of the department, college, or Board to decide.

The motion to recommend this new wording in Article III, Section 7 of the Regulations of the Board of Trustees was put to a vote and carried. This will now be transmitted by the University Council Chairman to the President for transmittal to the Trustees for consideration. //

In bringing up the other item, to add the word, "Early", to the section of the Appendix to the Regulations of the Board of Trustees which is entitled, "Limited Teaching for Teaching Faculty Who Retire", it was pointed out that this was intended only to clarify the distinction between part-time teaching under the Phase-Down Program and part-time teaching after age 70.

The motion to transmit this amendment to the Board of Trustees was put to a vote and carried. This will also be sent to the President by the University Council Chairman for consideration by the Board of Trustees. //

On behalf of Dean Gent, Mr. Jamison presented the new item of business on the agenda, "Proposed Amendments to the Bylaws of the Graduate Faculty", which were passed by the Graduate Faculty at their meeting of May 8, 1980. He moved their adoption:

// Article IV. Membership

"Section 7 (to replace present Section 7): A person whom the department wishes to teach graduate courses and/or direct theses or dissertations, but who is not employed on a full-time basis, may be appointed to Graduate Faculty membership. Such appointments shall follow the guidelines and procedures of Article IV, Section 2, excluding the requirements of full-time faculty status, and shall be for three-year terms. At the time a full-time Graduate Faculty member chooses to enter the phase-down retirement program, he or she may be appointed to a five-year term [changed later to: a term not to exceed five years] to the Graduate Faculty in the same categories available to full-time Graduate Faculty members.

"Renumber present Section 7 to become Section 8.

"Renumber and change present Section 8 to become Section 9: Delete last sentence which reads: 'Temporary and Visiting Graduate Faculty shall not have the right to vote at Graduate Faculty meetings or elections.'

"Add new Section 10: Only those members of Graduate Faculty who hold full-time appointments at The University of Akron are eligible to vote at Graduate Faculty meetings or elections."

Because of some confusion in interpretation of the phrase "may be appointed to a five-year term" in new Section 7, Dr. Leathers recommended a substitution which was accepted and which now reads, "may be appointed to a term not to exceed five years".

The Chairman reminded the Council that it has the right to amend the Graduate Faculty Bylaws, but the Bylaws must also go to the Board of Trustees finally. //

The motion to adopt the changes in the Graduate Faculty Bylaws was seconded and carried. //

Dr. Leathers asked Council members to convey to all their colleagues, committees, etc., the importance of submitting their grades on time at the close of this fall semester because the Computer Center is moving to its new quarters over the holidays. The cooperation of every college and department will be greatly appreciated.

The Chairman also mentioned the precarious financial situation in the state and the possibility of the Legislature being called in special session to consider a tax increase. Currently the state agencies have had to face an additional budget cut.

As the meeting concluded, Dr. Leathers expressed the wish that all would have a good holiday season and look forward to a successful next semester.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:40 p. m.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF UNIVERSITY COUNCIL, November 6, 1980

The regular meeting of University Council was called to order by the Chairman, Senior Vice President Noel Leathers, at 3 p.m., Thursday, November 6, 1980 in Leigh 307.

Fifty-two of the 71 members of Council (including four ex officio for 1980-81) were present. Those absent with notice were Mr. H. Baldwin, Mr. L. Calabrese, Mrs. J. Chamberlain, Dr. L. DeYoung, Dr. M. Faron, Dr. H. Greene, Dr. C. E. Griffin, Mr. D. Jenkins, Dr. W. McGucken, Dr. R. Saslaw, Mr. J. Taggart, Dr. D. VanDervort. Others absent were Mr. G. Bandy, Mr. C. Dressler, Mrs. M. Gipson, Miss M. Hiss, Dr. G. Knieter, Mr. K. Pelanda, Mr. D. VanDoros. [Last month's minutes should have indicated that Dr. W. Nolin was absent with notice.]

The Chairman called for consideration of the minutes of the regular meeting of University Council of October 2, 1980 as printed in The University of Akron Chronicle of November 1, 1980. Hearing no objections, the Chairman declared the minutes approved.

Because the President was delayed briefly in reaching the meeting, Dr. Leathers called upon Dr. Carrino to report on the United Way campaign. Dr. Carrino was pleased to announce that the University had gone over the \$45,000 goal before the October 29 general campaign deadline, and already the receipts are \$50,351.07, with the possibility of more late returns. He expressed appreciation to all who had assisted on the drive with its 10 percent oversubscription.

Dr. Leathers congratulated the campaign committee and all those on the campus who had participated.

At this point Dr. Guzzetta arrived, and the Chairman turned the meeting over to him. The President also heartily congratulated the staff and faculty who had worked for this successful culmination of the campaign.

Dr. Guzzetta said that it is customary for the summary of teaching faculty salary ranges to be announced at the November meeting of Council. Although these statements are already in the campus mail to all full-time faculty, he would cite the totals. It is always interesting to know how Akron compares with its sister state institutions, but to date only four institutions have revealed their current averages—Toledo, Miami and Kent, and we are No. 2 among those four. He noted that the University benefits rose from 19.4 percent last year to 19.8 percent for 1980-81, due to the dental insurance recently added. The range for salary is from \$14,000 minimum for instructors to \$40,900 maximum for professors. This contrasts with a range from \$13,425 to \$37,668 last year. The range of minimum compensation for instructors this year is \$17,532 to a maximum of \$48,034 for professors, and this contrasts with a range from \$16,217 to \$44,636 last year. The average salary for the 645 teaching faculty this year is \$24,584 and the average compensation is \$29,462. Last year the comparable figures were \$22,563 for 628 full-time teaching faculty, and \$26,937 compensation. The 1980-81 average salary for instructors is \$17,113, for assistant professors is \$20,569, for associate professors \$25,201, and for professors \$31,768.

In response to a question, he stated that visiting and adjunct professors are not included. He added that when information is available from the other state universities comparing salaries, it will be forwarded. Some of the institutions no longer send their statistics to AAUP as we do.

Dr. Guzzetta said that the universities had not been informed yet as to the possible additional cut in subvention. It might be from 3 to 10 percent more and could be retroactive to July 1, 1980. It was also expected that the capital improvement budget would not be passed, unless to provide only for utilities and renovation. When the Inter-University Council meets on November 11, the situation would be discussed.

Dr. Vander Ark asked for guidance in his participation at the next meeting of the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor regarding our stance on the loss of interest income to universities by holding up subvention checks to institutions. All state institutions are opposed to a delay in forwarding monthly appropriation checks because this cuts into interest income on monies available for short-term investment. He said it would be a tight year financially, but there was no need to panic.

The Chairman then called for the reports of the standing committees. Dr. Bruce Holland announced that the Procedural Committee had met on October 23, 1980 to set the agenda for today's meeting of Council. Dr. Lawrence Focht, Chairman of the Library and Learning Resources Committee, had raised the question of replacements for two members of his committee who will be on leave during the spring semester. It was decided that a practical policy in the future would be for the Procedural Committee to appoint an extra committee member initially to those committees whose membership included persons scheduled for a semester of leave. Anyone scheduled for a full year's leave would not be given a committee assignment. Two substitutions on the Library Committee would probably be appointed at the December meeting of Council. The Procedural Committee also corrected an earlier oversight by adding Mr. Gordon Larson, Director of Athletics, to the Athletics Committee as an ex officio member.

In accordance with the expressed desire of President Guzzetta to include the Dean of Wayne General and Technical College as a member of University Council, the Secretary of Council had prepared for circulation to Council members and the faculty the proposed amendment to the Council Bylaws which appears on today's agenda, which was distributed to all faculty.

The Procedural Committee had discussed two other motions also included and circulated on the agenda for today's meeting. Various simplifications in language suggested by the committee had been subsequently approved by the proposer, Dr. Philip Stuyvesant. Professor Emile Grunberg's request to attend today's meeting and contribute to any discussion of these motions was granted.

Dr. Watt, on behalf of the Academic Policies, Calendar and Curriculum Committee, presented the proposed University calendars for 1981-82 and 1982-83, as well as potential calendars for 1983-84, 1984-85 and 1985-86. He answered a query by stating that there are the same number of instructional days in the semester calendars as prevailed under the quarter system. X

Dr. Carrino noted that contracts which have been ending on August 31 would have to be adjusted with the new semester starting the end of August.

Dr. Watt moved that Council adopt the five-year calendars. The motion was seconded. Then it was moved that the motion be laid on the table until the December meeting of Council. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dean Barker, for the Athletics Committee, said that Joel Price had met all NCAA and OVC requirements to transfer back to Akron with eligibility for the 1980-81 basketball season. He mentioned that the University is presently hosting a team of inquiry on Titles VI and IX. He also noted that the University's basketball games will have WAKR radio coverage this year. WHLO will cover Kent.

In response to Dr. Dye's question, Dr. Barker said that the Title IX investigation concerned track as a woman's varsity sport, which it will become next fall, and that the Title VI inquiry concerned an allegation of race discrimination in women's basketball. Of 89 colleges and universities nationally which are under question, Akron is among the first eight being visited.

Dr. Nolin told the Council that two complaints had been considered by the Faculty Rights and Responsibilities Committee, and assigned file numbers FR 1980-1 and 2. After deliberation, both grievances were rejected.

In the absence of Dr. Howard Greene, chairman, Dr. Focht read the report from the Faculty Well-Being Committee which had met on October 16 with invited guests, Mrs. Faith Helmick and Mrs. Desnay Severit. They had discussed the many aspects of the new dental insurance package and reviewed recent changes in the medical insurance program so that the information could be reported back to collegiate faculties by the appropriate committee representatives. The next meeting of the Faculty Well-Being Committee is scheduled for November 21, the primary agenda item being the updated University liability insurance coverage. Mr. Michael Sermersheim of Legal Services has been invited to attend. Future agenda items will include STRS and other medical insurance needs. Anyone wishing to bring an item of concern to the attention of the committee should address the collegiate representative or chairman.

Dr. Focht then continued as chairman of the Library and Learning Resources Committee, reporting that its second meeting was held on October 14. At that time two subcommittees were named, with Mr. Alvin Lieberman serving as chairman of the Budget Subcommittee, and Dr. John MacDonald as chairman of the Collection Development Policies Subcommittee.

The chairman of the Research (Faculty Projects) Committee, Dr. Gent, announced that 28 proposals had been received for the winter, for a \$48,000 allocation. Another competition will be scheduled in the spring. The meetings have been set up now for consideration and assignment of the projects. In response to the question as to the quality of the proposals this fall, the Dean remarked that "Merit is always variable!"

Dean Hansford said that the first meeting of the Student Affairs Committee was held on October 7, to organize. Miss Barbara Hazard, Director of Student Development, was named chairman of the Extracurricular Activities Subcommittee, and Mr. Robert Hahn, Director of Student Financial Aids, chairman of the Awards, Scholarships, Grants and Loans Subcommittee. Membership on the two standing subcommittees will be based on the expressed preference of the members of the Student Affairs Committee. Mr. Hahn made a brief report on the projection of student financial aid for 1980-81, indicating the various types such as scholarships, awards, loans and employment. The total dollar projection is between \$14 and \$15 million which includes Guaranteed Student Loans. It appears that at least 8,000 students will benefit from one or more types of financial aids. Miss Hazard identified the role and activities of the Extracurricular Activities Subcommittee, including recommendations to the President of the University regarding the allocation of the Extracurricular Activities Fund monies.

Dr. Vander Ark, the Akron Representative on the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents, distributed his report of the October 23, 1980 meeting to the Council (it appears in the Appendix to these minutes), and commented on several aspects of their discussions. He referred to fee waiver reciprocity and expressed appreciation of the fact that Akron is one of two in the state which have it. The idea of a two-tiered fee structure for the first two years and second two years was presented to the Ohio Board of Regents by two-year schools. Chancellor Moulton had voiced opposition to this proposal for a number of reasons. Dr. Guzzetta interjected that The University of Akron has taken an official position opposing this proposal, and the reasons therefor. Dr. Carrino also commented on the support of the Evening College for the University's stand.

At the conclusion of Dr. Vander Ark's presentation, Dr. Leathers commended him on his fine reports and consistent good representation of The University of Akron.

Under "New Business", the first item was read by the Council Secretary, Dr. Bruce Holland: "Proposed amendment to the University Council Bylaws to add to Article III, Section b. the words 'and Wayne General and Technical College' immediately following the words 'Community and Technical' and before the parenthesis." He moved adoption of the amendment which was seconded. It was then moved to table the motion until the next meeting of Council. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Stuyvesant, who had originally proposed the next item, read from the agenda, "Proposed recommendation to be transmitted from University Council to the University Board of Trustees to add a paragraph to Division A, Article III, Section 7 of the Regulations of the Board of Trustees to read: 'Retired faculty members as well as other qualified persons may be given part-time teaching contracts after they have attained the age of 70.'" He moved its adoption. The motion was seconded. //

Dr. Watt inquired if this wording would apply to others and General Faculty to be employed in other kinds of positions, not teaching. It was Dr. Stuyvesant's opinion that it pertained to those teaching only.

Dr. Leathers asked if staff could be included for teaching under these provisions, and Dr. Stuyvesant thought they could.

Dr. Lehrman felt that the word "may" indicated greater leeway since the word "must" was not used.

Dean Rakas considered the meaning of the proposed amendment clear with the restriction to "teaching" contracts.

It was Dr. Grunberg's opinion that the intent of the recommendation was to provide exceptions for very specific and high quality faculty members whose expertise was needed at a given point.

Dr. Stuyvesant next presented the third proposal on the "New Business" agenda, which read, "Proposed recommendation to be transmitted from University Council to the University Board of Trustees to amend the section of the Appendix to the Regulations of the Board of Trustees which is entitled, 'Limited Teaching for Teaching Faculty Who Retire', by adding the word 'Early' at the end of the above title." He moved its adoption. The motion was seconded.

When the Chair asked the will of Council as to tabling the two motions, Dr. Stuyvesant doubted that necessity since they were not Council Bylaws amendments, but only recommendations to be transmitted to the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Siloac then moved to table the two motions until the next meeting of University Council. The motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Leathers asked the members of Council to read over the proposals which had been on the agenda, and suggested that the matters might be discussed with Drs. Stuyvesant and Grunberg.

The Chairman then reminded the Council that if these motions are approved, the procedure provides for their transmission to President Guzzetta who would in turn bring them to the attention of the Educational Policy Committee of the Board of Trustees, and then that Committee would forward its recommendation to the full Board of Trustees.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:50 p.m.

REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF AKRON REPRESENTATIVE TO THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE CHANCELLOR OF THE OHIO BOARD OF REGENTS—Dr. Sherman Vander Ark

Meeting of October 23, 1980

Chancellor Moulton responded to the following topics:

Enrollments. Chancellor Moulton reported that the increase in enrollments for higher education ranged from 3 percent at main campuses to 13 percent at technical colleges. The weighted mean for the total enrollment increase was 4.5 percent. Although the FTE was up, the funds of the first-year biennium were down by \$8 million because of the LBO's low projections. It was Dr. Moulton's stated intention that this information be viewed as a need to increase subsidy support rather than enrollment support. This idea was augmented by the notion that universities appear to be moving into the service area. Chancellor Moulton was concerned that this direction must not be met at the potential expense of the needs of the liberal arts.

Current Budget. The state has a cash flow problem which may lead to the deferring of December payments for thirty to sixty days. The impact of this cut is the loss of interest on that money (this amounts to about \$100,000 for OSU). Chancellor Moulton stated that he will attempt to prevent further direct cuts to higher education.

Two-Tiered Fee Structure. The idea of a two-tiered fee structure for the first two years and second two years has been presented to OBOR. Presently, information is being obtained before a decision is made on this concept. Dr. Moulton is recommending that this idea be rejected because of potential cost and administrative problems. He is hopeful that the new formula will help resolve the funding problems of some two-year institutions.

Fee Waiver Reciprocity. FAC sought Dr. Moulton's views on the inter-university fee waiver reciprocity. FAC will be seeking advice from the presidents on this matter.
